COURSE DESCRIPTIONS FOR SPECIAL TOPICS CLASSES

CIT390 01 Advanced Excel

This is a four-week summer course for students and professionals who want to improve their Excel skills and learn advanced Excel features that could help them in many research and data processing areas. There are three levels of Excel: beginning Excel which is similar to CIT105, Intermediate Excel which deals with advanced Excel formulas and array formulas and Advanced Excel which deals with more complicated formula issues and VBA. The level of material covered in this course will be determined by the audience of the class. CIT105 or knowledge of Excel is a prerequisite.

ENG390 01 Vampires in Folklore & Fiction

From Vlad the Impaler and Dracula to Anne Rice and Buffy the Vampire Slayer, the vampire has long been part of human folklore. While the means of communicating that folklore has changed from oral tradition to syndicated television shows and role playing games, the allure of the bloodsucker is undeniable. The historical roots of this myth will be examined as will the literary development of the concept of vampirism. demonstrate literary interpretation, civil rights, the classic hero's journey, and issues of censorship. The entire Harry Potter phenomenon (conferences, fan fiction, release parties, and literacy) will be discussed in a social as well as literary context. The novels, supporting materials, critical articles, and some of the film versions of the books will be used as the resources of this course. Prerequisite ENG142.

HIS290 01 History Through Movies, Music & Lit

Musicians, cinematographers, and writers have frequently used, and misused, history in their creative projects. Even if it is misused, songs, movies, and literature provide a wonderful entre into various periods of history. This class will investigate a wide-ranging list of historical periods and topics through songs, movies, and books. While it does not concentrate on a single time or period, the class will seek to understand historical causation and search for those points where important themes and ideas connect. Prerequisite ENG141; writing intensive course.

MAT290 01 Applied Business Mathematics

A mathematical study in the applications of algebra, trigonometry, geometry, probability and statistics, finite math, and elementary calculus to business topics and practices. Students in this special topic course will utilize and apply a variety of mathematical formulas, graphs and tables to real-life business word problems. The course is designed for additional applications in economics, finance, accounting, and management especially for those students who may wish to pursue graduate work in business. Prerequisite MAT174 or MAT 181 or instructor permission.

MGT390 01 The Business of Golf

The fundamentals of business and the fundamentals of golf are very similar. Golf and business have strong links to one another. Each can be fun, certainly competitive, and there is a never-ending thirst for knowledge and ways to improve in both. Business and golf both need proper planning, good organization and a desire to be the best. This course will teach you the art of building business relationships on the links. Prerequisite MGT201 or instructor permission.
