

BACHELOR OF CRIMINAL JUSTICE IN CRIMINALISTICS

What is Criminalistics?

Criminalistics is the application of scientific methods to evaluate physical evidence from a crime scene for use in criminal proceedings. Tiffin University's criminalistics program equips students with essential skills for collecting, assessing and preserving evidence and presenting it effectively in court.

Why study Criminalistics?

The Bachelor of Criminal Justice in criminalistics is for students who desire to become law enforcement officers specializing in forensic evidence. In this program, students will learn to identify, sort, compare, interpret and catalog evidence according to strict legal and scientific rules. The major provides a focus for the student who wishes to be a crime scene investigator but who is not interested in conducting laboratory analysis of evidence. They will receive a solid foundation for a career as a crime scene investigator, working in local, state and federal police departments, as well as private investigative services.

The criminalistics program combines classroom teaching with a unique progression of hands-on learning that advances experience from the crime scene to the courtroom. Students will link theoretical principles to practical application in our crime scene house, where they'll gain valuable experience processing mock crime scenes.

- The criminalistics program emphasizes the investigation of specific crimes including, but not limited to, homicide, sexual assault, aggravated assault, robbery, burglary, theft, auto theft and arson.
- Students will develop expert knowledge in processing physical evidence, including blood and biological, impression, fingerprint, firearm, drug, digital, tool mark and trace evidence.
- Students work closely with faculty who bring significant field experience in the discipline.
- Students engage in many experiential learning opportunities, from our crime scene house to a hands-on course in death investigations utilizing the anatomage table, a device for conducting virtual autopsies.

- At TU, students can graduate with a degree in criminalistics and your OPOTA (Ohio Police Officer Training Academy) Certification in four years.
- Our Criminal Justice Experiential Learning Center allows students to apply what they learn in the classroom to real-world situations – in a realistic yet controlled environment.
- An internship in the field is a required part of the curriculum, often leading to a foot in the door to a first job in the field.
- TU partners with The Washington Center Internship Program, which can provide students a unique opportunity to intern with federal agencies in Washington D.C.
- Students may also be able to participate in the Cold Case Fellowship Program, where they investigate active and pending cold cases across the country.

Receiving an education makes graduates competitive candidates. It also opens more opportunities for them, as many law enforcement agencies require a formal education.

What can I do with a Bachelor of Criminal Justice in Criminalistics degree?

The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics predicted that openings for forensic technicians will increase by 14% in the decade preceding 2029, which is more than triple the average for all occupations nationally (four percent).

Salary ranges in criminal justice vary depending on factors such as location, experience and education. It's always best to refer to official sources such as the Bureau of Labor Statistics (at bls.gov) or consult with specific law enforcement agencies/organizations for the most accurate and up-to-date salary information. Due to difficulties in hiring and retaining qualified applicants, many departments are offering hiring bonuses between \$1,000 to \$75,000 as well.
