What is Law Enforcement?

Law enforcement refers to the system and activities undertaken by governmental and non-governmental organizations to ensure that laws are enforced, public safety is maintained and order is preserved within a society. Law enforcement agencies are responsible for preventing and investigating crimes, apprehending individuals who violate laws and maintaining community peace and order. These agencies play a crucial role in upholding the rule of law and ensuring the safety and well-being of citizens.

Law enforcement agencies can exist at various levels, from local and state departments to federal agencies like the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) in the United States and U.S. Territories. The structure and responsibilities of law enforcement agencies can vary significantly based on factors such as jurisdiction, size of the community and the nature of the threats they face.

Why study Law Enforcement?

The law enforcement profession in the United States confronts some of the most difficult problems and issues that any nation can experience, as it provides public safety services to our citizens. The Tiffin University Bachelor of Criminal Justice (BCJ) degree with a law enforcement major provides the foundation for successful employment and practice. At TU, students will receive an innovative academic and practical education in the law, the behavioral sciences and the political process. Students will participate in hands-on, practical application of theoretical principles learned in the classroom.

- At TU, students can graduate with a law enforcement degree and become OPOTA (Police Academy) certified in just four years.
- Our Criminal Justice Experiential Learning Center allows students to apply what they learn in the classroom to real-world situations – in a realistic, but controlled, environment.
- An internship in the field is a required part of the curriculum, often leading to a foot in the door to a first job in the field.
- TU partners with The Washington Center Internship Program, which provides students with a unique opportunity to intern with federal agencies while living in Washington D.C. for a semester.

• Students may have an opportunity to participate in the Cold Case Fellowship Program, which allows selected students to work on active/pending cold cases selected from across the country.

Receiving an education makes graduates competitive candidates. It also opens more opportunities for them, as many law enforcement agencies require a formal education.

What can I do with a Bachelor of Criminal Justice in Law Enforcement degree?

Law enforcement is a challenging yet rewarding career field, with many job openings across the country. The field also offers career mobility, as police officers can work in a variety of areas within law enforcement.

How much will I earn with a BCJ in Law Enforcement?

Salary ranges in criminal justice vary depending on factors such as location, experience and education. It's always best to refer to official sources such as the Bureau of Labor Statistics (at bls.gov) or consult with specific law enforcement agencies/organizations for the most accurate and up-to-date salary information. Due to difficulties in hiring and retaining qualified applicants, many departments are offering hiring bonuses between \$1,000 and \$75,000 as well.
