

BACHELOR OF ARTS IN PSYCHOLOGY/ ADDICTIONS COUNSELING CONCENTRATION

What is Addictions Counseling?

The Bachelor of Arts in Psychology with an addictions counseling concentration provides hands-on skills and clinical education in problems of substance use, abuse and dependence and other related and co-occurring mental health addictive issues. Our program is designed to meet the educational requirements for Chemical Dependency Counselor licensure status and the international certification standards in addiction counseling. Faculty members teaching in the program are licensed professionals with experience working in the mental health and/or addictions field.

Students in the program can complete an internship in the field and work on the 220 hours of practical experience in the 12 core areas required for licensure. By achieving this and completing all the required coursework, students will only need one year of experience in the field (2,000 hours) to sit for the licensure exam and become licensed at the second highest level for chemical dependency counselors in Ohio.

Why study Addictions Counseling?

Our addictions counseling courses are unique as we focus on simulated counseling sessions, diagnostic assessments, group counseling sessions and treatment plans. Students will gain the foundation needed through hands-on skills and clinical education to obtain a chemical dependency license or advance to graduate school.

What can I do with a bachelor of arts in Psychology/Addictions Counseling degree?

Before finishing their degree, students can apply for the Chemical Dependency Counselor Assistant License (after taking CSL 310). A minor in addictions counseling adds valuable skills and knowledge to majors who may not practice as a counselor but work with people facing addiction issues. Due to the current opioid epidemic, there is a high demand for chemical dependency counselors and many of our students report being able to find employment in the field before graduation.

How Much Will I Earn with a BA in Psychology/Addictions Counseling?

Due to the diversity and broad nature of the field, students have a variety of potential employment opportunities with varying levels of pay. The job market listed below indicates average salaries by profession. Please note that many of the professions listed below require further specialized education well beyond the bachelor's degree, and a BA in Psychology/Addictions Counseling alone may not qualify you for several of these positions. Please confer with your academic advisor for further information on the type and level of education required for these listed professions.

Dual Enrollment/4+1
