What is Human Services?

A career in human services gives the power to support others when they need it most. The BA psychology with a concentration in human services will provide a solid grounding in psychology and sociology, covering the topics of social systems, ethics, crisis intervention, the science of the mind and more. With a focus on improving the lives of others, the program prepares students for a rewarding career in a diverse range of helping professional fields.

Why study Human Services?

Individuals who go into human services fields such as social work, counseling or community programs do so with a desire to help people in need and make a meaningful impact on others' lives. By studying human services, students will gain insight into human psychology, relationships, challenges people face and paths to personal growth and fulfillment. The field allows graduates to work with non-profit organizations and advocate for those in underserved populations.

The human services program at Tiffin University emphasizes practical experience and fieldwork. Students have opportunities to gain valuable skills and apply what they learn through internships, service-learning projects and working with clients. More specifically, students can intern in Washington D.C. at sites such as the National Mental Health Association and Offender Aid and Restoration. Locally, students have interned with Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASA), domestic violence shelters and victim advocacy services.

According to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, the demand for employment for social and human service assistants is expected to grow nine percent by 2032Q. Dual Enrollment/4+1

Students who wish to be promoted to leadership positions in the field or practice clinical work in the future will eventually need to complete their graduate degree.
